

Lion

Did you know that lions are the only cat in the world that live in groups? A group of lions is called a pride. Each pride has about 3 males and 12 females. Lions can live for over 10 years in the wild. Today there are only about 21 000 lions left in Africa. 70 years ago there were over 40 000 lions in Africa.



Lions are pretty lazy animals. Male lions can sleep for over 24 hours after a large meal (that is one whole day)! Most days male lions sleep around 20 hours. This means that they are only awake for 4 hours a day. Female lions are responsible for the hunting and food. Because of this, female lions sleep a little bit less than the males. Female

Lions are one of the largest cats. They can weigh between 113-190 kilograms. The average weight of a house cat is 3.5 kilograms. Lions are far larger than house cats. A lion can measure about 2.5 metres from head to tail. Baby lions are called cubs. Lion cubs weigh about 1.3 kilograms when born.

Male lions are usually larger and weigh more than female lions. Lions are different than house cats in many ways. It is easy to tell the difference between a male lion and a female lion. Male lions have a mane. The lion mane has long, thick hair that surround the male lion's face. It runs down the neck and ends at their backs. Female lions do not have manes.



- Using recycled cardboard (cereal box etc) draw a large square, medium square (face), large rectangle (body) 4 small rectangles (legs), very small rectangle and circle (tail)
- 2. Using orange or yellow paint, paint the shapes.
- 3. After the paint dries, cut out the shapes ensuring you round the corners.
- 4. Use a black permanent waterproof marker to add the details.
- 5. To create visual interest, add lines to create patterns for the head. Then, add more patterns to the rest of the pieces that don't overlap each other.
- 6. When finished, glue the pieces of the animal together with liquid glue by starting with the **OVERLAPPING** pieces first.
- 7. For the legs and tails, put a dot of glue on them, then slide them behind the body shape.

Meanwhile, Edward's father was preparing the yellow bus.






If you owned a double – decker bus and were able to change the inside of the bus what would you do? In the boxes below draw a floor plan of the top and bottom levels of your double – decker bus.








Investigating 2D shapes – symmetry and tessellation

An axis of symmetry is a line that divides something exactly in half. When one half of a shape or picture matches the other exactly, we say it's symmetrical.









This shape is asymmetrical.


Look carefully at each shape. For any that are symmetrical, draw in the line of symmetry.

You can think of the line of symmetry as a mirror. One half of a design or shape is reflected.




This tile demonstrates the movements of flip, slide and turn.


